

Mildura Palimpsest Biennale #10, 2015 is an international biennale of experimental contemporary art staged in Mildura, Australia; which presented new site-specific, residency based works by 76 artists from many nations across Australia and around the world, in October 2015.

The biennale theme: everywhere all at once...here, examines contemporary notions of 'the virtual and the grounded' via major intercultural, collaborative and durational projects. Connecting global and local communities through diverse artistic practices, from cyber technologies to 'walking country', as the core collaborative mediums, Mildura Palimpsest Biennale #10 embraces it's specific location as a small city, on the banks of Australia's largest river and on the edge of the deserts to the north. With over 75 international languages spoken in the Mildura region, this unique residency-based biennale is a powerful locus for artists to envision our multi-faceted contemporary world anew.

"This Biennale shifts the idea of regional Australia and places it at the heart of the Australian experience, on an equal footing with the city and in a context of global art. [...] giving equal standing to key ideas and concepts that might once have been thought to sit at the periphery. These are ideas that link the traditional to the contemporary, the remote to the global, the outside to the inside. There is a powerful conviction that what happens on this continent is, by its very nature, already international."

This presents great opportunities to work collaboratively in ways that are non-hegemonic and which are more meaningful in terms of the full diversity of Australia's dynamic intercultural identity, unique in the context of global art practice.

The Mildura Palimpsest Biennale #10 | Opening Long Weekend Experience, began with the Wiimbia Mayii Kulpa Larna Bush Symposium, led by Mungo Elders, Artists & Thinkers at Willandra Lakes Region World Heritage Area / Mungo National Park.



Wiimbia Mayii Kulpa Larna was proposed and conceived by Ricky Mitchell (Paakantji), MPB#10 artist and organising committee member.

The Bush Symposium commenced with a Welcome to Country by Paakantji, Mutthi Mutthi and Ngyiaampaa Elders, at the Mungo Visitors Centre. After lunch the symposium moved to the Mungo Youth Project site on Top Hut Station (part of Willandra Lakes Region World Heritage Area) for the presentation of a major ceremonial intercultural and collaborative art work by fourteen *Unmapping the End of the World* artists. This was followed by an informal discussion between artists, elders and audience around the Biennale theme: everywhere all at once...here.

A tightly packed program on the day included lunch and discussion / viewing of artists installations at Mungo National Park. These include: Yutaka Kobayashi (Japan) World's First Baker, a durational collaborative project with local Indigenous and non-Indigenous school children, growing, harvesting, grinding and baking native millet into damper in solar ovens, made by the students. Yutaka presented a discussion in collaboration with author Bruce Pascoe; Shannon Young's Basin Abulations: Lake Mungo, the residue of an epic walk with a shopping trolley and a frozen block of Murray River water across Lake Mungo; and Mandi King's, Cloud Catcher, made in collaboration with local Mildura Sunraysia Spinners and Weavers.

After the welcome by the elders, the Wiimbia Mayii Kulpa Larna (Mungo Bush Symposium) commenced with the ceremonial filling of glass vessels with earth, sand, ash, air, water, or charcoal from each of the fourteen Unmapping the End of the World artists home countries. This was an important moment for the intercultural, collaborative and durational exhibition project that commenced in April 2015, in partnership with the inaugural Willandra Wisdom Walk at Willandra Lakes Region UNESCO World Heritage Area / Mungo National Park, then travelled to the Kumano Kodo UNESCO World Heritage listed Pilgrimage in Japan and the Valcamonica UNESCO World Heritage Rock Art Valley in Italy. This work was later unveiled on the Opening Night of Mildura Palimpsest Biennale #10, at Mildura Arts Centre.



Mungo Youth Project Partnership Yutaka Kobayashi The World's First Baker



In 2014/15 Japanese artist in residence Yutaka Kobayashi worked with selected students from 3 local schools in collaboration with the Mungo Youth Project. Yutaka made a major collaborative installation titled World's First Baker, which was developed with Indigenous and non-Indigenous students over a period of 12 months. The final work was exhibited at Willandra Lakes Region World Heritage Area for Mildura Palimpsest Biennale #10 2015, along with the symposium discussion between the artist and Bruce Pascoe.

Unmapping the End of the World is an international, durational & experimental art project that brings together a contingent of 14 Australian, European and Japanese artists for a unique intercultural contemporary art exhibition journey across three UNESCO World Heritage Sites in Australia, Japan and Italy and culminating in a major collaborative installation as the Opening Event of Mildura Palimpsest Biennale #10, 2015.

A combination of deep cultural knowledge and open collaboration was required from all artists. By fostering active participation in knowledge sharing between cultures in specific places and presenting durational work in direct response to this, Unmapping the End of the World asked the key question: What does rootedness, groundedness, and local identity mean in an age of globalization and technological revolution?

A contemporary Walking Country meets E-Media project on three continents. The walks and discussions that collectively spannned a four-week period were the catalyst for each artist to create new work in response to their conversations and experience; for this major exhibition at Mildura Arts Centre, in the inland city of Mildura, Australia in October 2015.







Weaving Stories (Murray River) invited contemporary weavers the length of the Murray River to create a major installation for Mildura Palimpsest Biennale #10, 2015. Artists: Clair Bates, Tina Doolin, Ellen Trevorrow, Samantha Doolin, Charlie Davis, Jennifer Bates, Glenda Nicholls, Bronwyn Razem, Debra Rankine, Jelina Haines, Alice Abdulla and Anne McMahon.

From February to July 2015, a series of weaving workshops were held in several locations along the river, in Mildura (Feb), Camp Coorong SA (early April), Mildura (July), Camp Coorong SA (August), Mildura (September/October).

Weaving Stories culminated in a significant intercultural contemporary installation for Mildura Palimpsest Biennale #10 in October 2015. The installation was produced and woven both collaboratively and individually. At the heart of the work are massive woven fish nets and a bark canoe, woven figures and animals. The exhibition was opened with a powerful public dance performance by the Murray Darling Dreamtime Dancers before the audience entered through a woven archway directly into the installation.





Walking Slowly Downhill, is a major durational artwork by Domenico de Clario (Aus/Italy), with Steven Rhall (Taungurung), September - December 2105.

Domenico de Clario is currently walking the entire length of the Murray River from its source at Mt. Kosciuszko National Park to the river mouth at Goolwa, SA.

"I'll encounter many people, places, events, and things on this trek. These encounters will form material for a work of art, or multiple works of art, which I hope will bring attention to the Murray region, its people, and its history, particularly to its Indigenous histories, and the histories and realities of the intersection of Indigenous and non-Indigenous peoples. I hope that by focusing on the Murray we may be able to illuminate things about Australia more generally. I don't wish to "interview" anyone, "methodically" gather or appropriate anyone's stories or knowledge. I don't seek to speak for or to represent anyone other than myself and my own experiences and encounters. I'm not demanding anyone tell me or share their stories, although I'll accept any that come to me. I don't know if anyone will want to meet me, greet me, or walk with me, but I'll appreciate it if anyone does. I simply want to walk alongside the Murray River as far as I possibly can, to stay open to the encounters I may have along the way, and to respond in different ways—writing, painting, music, and so on—in order to make an art work whose outcome I don't yet know.

Supporting artist Steven Rhall (Taungurung) is collaborating, documenting, uploading a daily live webcast and piloting the support vehicle for the duration of the journey.



Imagine for a moment that there is no such thing as history; and that rather, everything that has ever happened is always entirely present, everywhere all at once...here.

Mildura Palimpsest Biennale #10 brings more than 70 artists together from many nations across Australia and around the world and presents a durational two year program of experimental, site-specific, new work, engaging with the theme of everywhere all at once—here. Such enquiry is inherently intercultural and invites artistic engagement at the contemporary nexus between 'the virtual and the grounded'.

Mildura is a diverse intercultural zone at the edge of the idea of disurbanity[i]; a powerful locus of intercultural contemporaneity that is capable of asking the key biennale question: What does connection to country, groundedness and local identity mean in an age of globalization and technological revolution?

Contemporary notions of post-national world order are so replete with ambivalence, that the dissolution of any delimiting intercultural 'palimpsest' will rightly be resolute with doubt and belief. Yet, any starting point in the world is of course already 'out of time'. *Mildura Palimpsest Biennale #10* resists the persistent biennale model of a 'temporary utopia'[ii] by inviting experimental and intercultural investigations into such post-national doubt and belief. Engaging with diverse intercultural belief systems that are generated by the global convergence of international traditions, beliefs and technologies, and are breakingwith global modernist timelines in meaningful ways, is arguably the central artistic challenge that defines our age.

For example, we can simultaneously recognize that contemporary knowledge about the continent of Australia and its place in the world has always been held by peoples from the hundreds of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander nations that have always lived here; and that contemporary knowledge about the Australian continent is held amid its global intercultural hybridity, made up of all the worlds nationalities, forming and reforming 'Australia' in perpetuity.

A globally significant dynamic exists between one of the most important sites of continuous human occupation in the world at Willandra Lakes Region World Heritage Area / Mungo National Park; local Indigenous nations the Latje Latje, Paakantji, Mutthi Mutthi and Ngiyaampaa peoples; and one of the most diverse local and migrant communities in the country, with over 65 international and 26 Indigenous languages spoken in Mildura. This distinctive cultural character is amplified by the visceral physical transition between the fertile yet liminal irrigated plains of Australia's largest river and the desert country that stretches out on all sides to the great inland of the Australian continent.

At first glance therefore, the Mildura region is a palimpsest of the highest order, a diverse intercultural zone layered with 'history' and yet presumed to be off the beaten track of the international art world. However, Mildura is in fact an inland city that harbours a far more complex generative agency, with a significant experimental art legacy[iii], capable of interpolating the shifting ground of the contemporary international, from an inland southern hemisphere locus. Concurrently however, outmoded notions of exclusivity and non-transmutable locus are often too presumptuous. Without actively seeking non-hegemonic intercultural collaborative agency that is capable of recognizing anew the contemporary simultaneity of ancient knowledge and virtual reality, we remain at risk of Elysian delusion with regard to equitable intercultural discussion.

Imagine for a moment that 'history' itself is a delimiting concept; and that out of 'history' we can perhaps reconfigure the core element of intercultural contemporaneity; the notion that we can be everywhere all at once...here. It is not for any one of us to know how or where such a collaborative journey might take us, but rather that we can be more open to how it might change us.
